## **FRENCH**

Why Study French?: The course aims to encourage candidates to develop a greater understanding and appreciation of French culture and society as well as developing the ability to understand, speak and write French. The two-year course comprises three components which cover the skills of speaking, reading, listening, translation and writing; these skills are built upon those acquired and practised at GCSE. Topics studied include: being a young person in French-speaking society; understanding the French-speaking world; diversity and difference; and French history in the twentieth century.

The Modern Languages department has a digital Sanako-Tandberg Language Laboratory where students are able to practise listening and speaking individually and with others, and a wide variety of literature.

## **Content and Assessment of the Course:**

## A Level French Component 1 Speaking (oral) 21-23 minutes oral 30%

The examination consists of two parts.

- 1 A presentation followed a discussion, on a project independently researched. Candidates take this opportunity to study an area or theme not otherwise covered by the specification and in doing so have the chance to research a topic of genuine personal interest relating to the Francophone countries.
- 2 Theme-based discussion. This involves a conversation on a topical theme chosen by the examiner from those studied for the examination. Candidates receive a conversation card to study and then discuss the topic with the examiner.

Component 2 Listening, Reading, and Translation into French 2½ hour examination 50%

This component comprises three sections:

- 1 Listening to texts in French and answering questions of different types
- 2 Reading texts in French and answering questions of different types Both these components test a candidate's comprehension.
- 3 Translation both into and out of French, each passage being a minimum of 100 words.

Component 3   Critical and analytical response in writing   2 hour examination   20%					
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This component comprises two essays of c300 words each on two literary texts or one literary text plus one film that the candidate has studied during the course. (Currently we study *Le Silence de la Mer* and *Au Revoir les Enfants*.)

The literary work(s) and film are chosen from a list specified by the examination board. All pupils normally study the same works in class, however independent reading out of the classroom is essential.

**Additional Information:** It is important to be able to express views orally and in writing on a wide range of topical themes such as the environment, the role of communications media, and employment, education, and so on, and to learn to defend a point of view in French. Each student has one lesson a week in a group of two or three with the Foreign Language Assistant from France, Belgium or Switzerland. We have also recently offered the opportunity to visit France.

Entrance Requirements: GCSE grade 7 in French.

In addition, candidates need to have a genuine interest in the culture, literature and society of the Francophone countries and in related current affairs. Essential are the genuine desire to speak French and the drive to undertake further reading willingly.
