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# FROM THE DESK OF THE HEADMASTER

# STAFF CHANGES DURING THE SPRING TERM 2017

There have been a small number of changes to staffing during the Spring Term

Dr Halsall, Head of Religious Studies, left us at the end of last term to take up an

Mrs Mason (Teacher of Economics) went on her maternity leave in January and is being covered by Mr Baggs. Ms Fasquel (Teacher of French and Spanish) also went on maternity leave in January and we have temporary arrangements in place to cover her classes. We look forward to welcoming Mrs Marsh, Head of Mathematics, back from her maternity leave after the Easter break.

Mr Farine has joined us to teach Technology, and Mrs Mumford has taken over the management of Technology. Miss Braiden, teacher of RE, left the School at the February Half Term, in order to return to Northern Ireland to retrain. Miss Braiden's classes have been taken by Mr Blackburn who is an experienced former Head of Religious Studies. Miss Braiden's

responsibilities for SENDCo are being temporarily covered by Mrs Mumford, and Mr Tresidder and Mr Barber have taken over her responsibilities for PSHEE.

Dr Halsall, Head of Religious Studies, left us at the end of last term to take up an academic post at Allen Hall Seminary. Dr Halsall has recently taken Holy Orders in the Catholic Church and completed his PhD. Dr Halsall has agreed to return for one day each week between April and June to support Religious Studies public examination teaching. The School will be re-timetabling classes to provide continuity of teaching for Religious Studies groups.

# CAPITAL DEVELOPMENT PROJECTS

The refurbishment of the Science Building has been completed and we are delighted with the work. The improvements to the Science Building were arranged in two phases. The first phase involved spending £1 million on refurbishing the outside of

the building; the walls were reconstituted and re-clad, the roof was replaced and new windows and external doors were fitted. The second phase involved refurbishing the inside of the building. The layout of the interior has been rationalised and the building now houses ten full-sized Science laboratories, three preparation rooms, office and work spaces for staff, as well as welfare facilities for pupils and staff. The recently completed refurbishment of the interior cost £1.5 million, and we hope to complete some landscaping works around the Science Building across the summer holiday period. We anticipate that our excellent new facilities will assist in enhancing the quality of teaching and learning.

The School is working closely with the Department for Education's Priority Schools Building Programme team to draw up plans to refurbish our Technology Building. This is a detailed process involving a variety of agencies and interested parties. Once the detailed planning has been completed a



contractor will be appointed and work will commence. I anticipate that this may take some time and further details will be shared with the community in due course.

# ELECTRIC GATES ON THE PRIVATE DRIVE

WHSB will be installing electric gates at the entrances to both ends of the School's Private Drive. This follows the successful installation of electric gates on the Eastwood Boulevard entrance. We have approached Westcliff High School for Girls regarding this project and we are pleased that they have agreed to join us in its implementation. The contractor will commence installing the gates during April and the process should take no more than six weeks. It is anticipated that the gates will remain open before and after school, when the gates are already patrolled by staff. The gates will be closed during the school day.

# FORTHCOMING PUBLIC EXAMINATIONS

This is a highly demanding School term for the public examination classes. I am sure students and parents are well aware of the significance of GCSE and A Level examinations in determining the range of future opportunities open to students. For the fourth consecutive year the

School has provided a broad range of Examination Revision Classes for our GCSE and A Level students during the Easter holiday. In addition, all of the staff, including myself and members of the Senior Team, will continue to offer encouragement, support and guidance to students to enable them to achieve their potential this summer.

I give all our GCSE and A level students my best wishes for their forthcoming examinations.

# LETTER FROM NICK GIBB, MINISTER OF STATE FOR SCHOOL STANDARDS

I have received a letter from Nick Gibb, Minister of State for School Standards, congratulating the pupils and staff at WHSB on the splendid GCSE results in August 2016. In his letter, he noted that following the publication of the National **Education Performance Tables in January** 2017. Westcliff High School for Boys was in the top 5% of schools nationally for value added (as measured by Progress 8). This is a wonderful achievement, as so many of our pupils have a high starting level which means they must achieve exceptionally high GCSE scores to add value. We are not complacent about such recognition and remain clearly focused on supporting the current GCSE pupils

to realise their full potential this summer. Nevertheless, it is a pleasure to share the details of the letter with members of the School community.

# YEAR 11: THE CHALLENGE AHEAD

Our Year 11 pupils return after the Easter break to a challenging GCSE Public Examination period that runs from 2 May until 26 June 2017. Pupils at this stage of their education in the Middle School should, after adhering to their own personal revision programmes and accessing support via targeted Easter revision sessions at School where appropriate, feel in control of this situation. However, there will be some who are not so self-assured of their position and who are finding the situation rather daunting and stressful. The worry may be detrimental to their performance and so to their eventual outcomes.

To those pupils in this position, the first thing to realise is that you are not alone. Thousands of pupils across the Country are all in a similar situation. If you are worried, and this may manifest itself in you not sleeping or eating properly, the worst thing that you can do is keep it to yourself. You should talk openly about your fears and concerns with others who have been through the examination system. This may be elder siblings, your parents or older pupils at WHSB. My colleagues and I are also here to listen and to help. Your subject teachers are always available to deal with specific issues which may be worrying you and will be able to direct you to sources of guidance and provide you with ample past-paper practice. If your concerns are of a more general nature then do come and see Mr Williams or me and we will do our best to allay your fears. You must however communicate.

Study Leave commences from 20 May and, in the week prior to that, pupils will attend timetabled lessons when they do not have an examination but will be free to carry out their own independent revision. Also, during this period, there will be arranged revision sessions in Biology, Chemistry, Physical Education and English Literature where the examination is imminent. These sessions

have proved particularly valuable in the past and have provided pupils with additional confidence when walking into their final GCSE examinations.

May I take this opportunity to wish you all the best with your examinations as you approach the conclusion of your time in the Middle School.

## **UCAS PROGRAMME**

Continuing to build on a programme established over more than ten years to support applications to the most prestigious universities, the School will host its annual Oxbridge Conference on Monday 26 June 2017. Admissions tutors, academics, staff and students from Oxford and Cambridge will visit the School to talk to potential applicants on a range of issues. They will seek to demystify the application process and the notorious interview, as well as providing concrete advice on the extra preparation expected over the summer of those who would seek to study at these ancient institutions. This year we have already conducted tours of both Cambridge and Oxford Universities, in the process meeting up with a number of the 34 former members of WHSB who are currently studying at Oxbridge.

We have also recommended students for University Study Days, supported applications for Sutton Trust Summer Schools and encouraged participation

through London University Taster courses and various Masterclasses hosted by Cambridge University. We have also booked places for all of Year 12 on the UCAS University Superfair held on Wednesday 14 June at the University of Essex campus, Colchester. All major universities are represented at that event, and students can collect Prospectuses as well as directing particular questions to the representatives from each institution. There are also talks on a wide range of subjects to do with course choice and the application process. Our annual Higher Education Evening, for all members of Year 12 and their parents, will take place in the School Hall on Wednesday 21 June, at 7:30pm.

# EXTENDED PROJECT QUALIFICATION DISSERTATION VIVAS

In the latter part of the Spring Term, Year 13 students took part in their Extended Project Qualification (EPQ) Viva assessments. These presentations lasted approximately 50 minutes and individuals presented their research to at least two members of staff and their peers. They explained what their dissertation was about, discussed research methods, critiqued evidence and elaborated on their findings, conclusions and evaluation. Students were then asked a series of detailed questions to test whether they understand their topic.

Projects are approximately 7,000 words in length and are of a highly academic nature. The quality this year has been exceptional and most are at first or even second-year undergraduate level. The

EPQ dissertation programme is aimed at high-achieving individuals who aspire to study at top Russell Group universities such as Cambridge, University College London (UCL), Imperial, London School of Economics (LSE), Oxford, Bristol and Southampton, for example.

It is particularly relevant for competitive degrees such as Geography, Medicine, Economics, Dentistry, History and Veterinary Medicine, to name but a few. Others choose to complete a dissertation on a subject that they do not study for Advanced Level, but wish to pursue at university. Examples include Archaeology, Anthropology, Law and Engineering.

# YEAR 12 AND THE FUTURE

Each year, the range of options open to Sixth Form students on leaving School becomes larger, and potentially more bewildering. While most of our students aspire to study a traditional subject at an established British university, a variety of other Colleges are available offering very specialist courses. There is also the option to study abroad, and the increasingly popular direct routes into employment (particularly Degree Apprenticeships) which are also worthy consideration in some instances.

For the budding university student, it is important that time is spent during the summer term (and summer holiday period) considering courses and, once a course is chosen, specific universities can be studied in depth and visited. While the range of courses is bewildering, it is never too soon to start investigating what is on offer; it is only as the detail is explored that questions and ideas form in a student's mind, which can eventually germinate into a decision. However the decision is made, students will need to have their application more-or-less complete (including a one-side Personal Statement) by the October half term break. Students applying for Medical, Dentistry, Veterinary or Oxbridge courses have a tighter deadline, and should



compete their side of the application by the end of September at the latest. For potential Apprentices the need for research is, if anything, more urgent as applications will need to be tailored to particular companies, and deadlines for applying can be as early as September of Year 13. These students are advised to seek the advice and guidance of Mrs Weller, our Work-Related Learning Coordinator, as soon as possible. She is able to meet with students on Wednesdays and Thursdays in the Community Development Office, which can be found at the bottom of the stairs next to Mrs Mumford's office.

WHSB provides particular events to assist students (and parents) with the decisions to be made. Details of the events are included in Mr Stevens' article on the UCAS programme, which also makes reference to our evening presentation at the School on 21st June for Year 12 students and their parents. During that presentation, information will be given to help with decision making, and the application process will be explained. A comprehensive booklet will be given out with further information. We do expect all Year 12 students to be present at this event, with a family member, to ensure that they can benefit from this information, most of which will be presented by our Higher Education Coordinator, Mr Stevens, whose knowledge is encyclopaedic and up to date.

Once students return from the May half term break, extensive time will be made



available to each student, in Form Periods, to discuss their thoughts with their Form Tutor, and work on their application. This will culminate in our Enrichment Day on Friday 7 July. Visiting speakers will provide advice on course selection and the writing of Personal Statements, and at least one past student will speak on the option of entering employment directly. Time will also be made available for students to use the computers to amend applications and research courses.

It is essential that students find the time to speak to Mr Stevens, Mrs Weller, subject specialists, Form Tutors and myself to explore the options. If handled with a positive mind, this period of time can be one of the most rewarding of the Sixth Form – there is indeed something for everyone, and it never does harm to lift your eyes to the horizon to glimpse the myriad possibilities.

Finally, potential Engineers were treated to an excellent talk by an ex-WHSG pupil, Nicole Simpson, who has completed her Advanced Engineering Apprenticeship at IPECO and accepted a permanent role within their Design Department.

# MINERAL, ROCK AND FOSSIL COLLECTION

We are extremely grateful to a member of our Alumni Community who recently donated a very generous sum of money in recognition of the enjoyable and worthwhile contribution made to his own education and those of many others by Head of Geology at the School, Mr Cooper.

With the sum of money, the Geology Department has been able to purchase a beautiful and varied collection of minerals, rocks and fossils which are now on permanent display near the front entrance of the School for the benefit of the whole School community. The Old Westcliffian wishes the exhibit to be named the "Nick Cooper Mineral and Fossil Collection", in recognition of the fact that Mr Cooper has taught the subject at the School for many years. The collection has already provoked much thought amongst parents, staff, students and visitors to the School.

Geology has been taught at Westcliff since 1976 when 'O' Level Geology was introduced and 1978 when A-Level Geology commenced. Since then GCSE and A-Level Geology have been taught uninterrupted through to the present day. Central to the teaching of Geology, and well known to many Old Westcliffians, have been the Year 10 Field Courses to Swanage, Dorset (since 1977) and the Year 12 Field Courses to Dyfed (1979 to 1987) and Isle of Arran (1987 to the present day). Such field courses have helped inspire many Old Westcliffians to



study the subject at University and pursue a geology career within such industries as oil and gas, mineral and rock, mining and engineering and environmental geology. Such vital industries provoke an interesting saying about the importance of Geology as a subject: "What we do not grow or hunt for, we must take from the

In the last twelve months, the Geology Department has prioritised the development of Technology. Recent developments have included the School's own seismograph which can record earthquakes from all over the world. This was supported financially by the British Geological Society (BGS) and interesting results are often displayed on the School's

website and social media feeds. Also, the Geology Department has its own Twitter account (@WHSBGeology). In the near future we hope to provide an opportunity for Old Westcliffian Geologists to link up with each other for the purposes of job and course opportunities, advice, social links and more. The School hopes that Old Westcliffian Geologists working within the industry might also be willing to provide advice to current students and perhaps contribute to the Westcliff Geology Conference held in December each year. # **COMBINED CADET FORCE**

# FIELD WEEKEND AT COLCHESTER GARRISON: A REVIEW

From 2 to 4 February, our Cadets participated in a Field Day weekend at Colchester Garrison. The aim of this weekend was to provide the Cadets with an opportunity to practice their weapon handling and to have a chance to fire rifles live.

After school on Thursday, the Cadets from Years 10, 11, 12 and 13 travelled to Colchester Garrison to take over the camp, set themselves up and participate in a "virtual" firing exercise on a Combat Trainer. In this exercise, Cadets handled rifles that were linked to a computer, and shot virtual rounds at a projected screen. This sort of firing is designed to offer comprehensive feedback, and it helped the Cadets in significantly improving their shooting posture and breathing habits.

On Friday, the same Cadets participated in a live firing exercise, shooting at targets on a 25m range. This allowed them an opportunity to put into practice all of the good technique that they had learned during the virtual firing exercises, and many of the Cadets had visibly improved.

Later, on Friday evening, the Year 9 Cadets joined us; they came to this camp primarily to improve their weapon handling skills as they have very little experience of working with rifles.

In all, the camp proved most successful. Cadets improved their understanding of the rifle and, more importantly, learned about the safe and responsible use of the rifle. Alongside this, they had a glimpse of what it was like living on a barracks, and of some of the activities in which members of the Armed Forces participate.

# SURVIVAL CAMP/LIVING IN THE FIELD

16 to 18 June 2017

From 16 to 18 June, the CCF will once again be joining up with Tunbridge Wells Girls Grammar Schools (TWGGS) for a two-night survival camp. During this period, the older Cadets will be left to their own devices, to live in the field for 48 hours while fulfilling recon and concealment criteria. It will be a good chance for the older Cadets to display all that they have learned across their careers, and it should pose some interesting problems for them to overcome.

Alongside this, we also plan on hosting the Living in the Field day once again for Year 9 Cadets. We will teach and train the Year 9 Cadets to live in the field, using bashas to shelter themselves and ration packs to feed themselves. We will also take time to teach them important lessons about navigating at night, and moving quietly in the field to scout out targets.

Both sets of Cadets will undertake many activities across the three days, all of which are hosted by either the Officers or the Senior Cadets. They will spend all of the days working in their sections, with the aim of developing their team working skills, and they will be tested on material that they have learned across the year, such as first aid and harbour drills.

Last year these two events were incredibly successful at giving our Cadets the first real glimpse of Cadet life in the field, and we hope this will once again prepare them for the Summer Camp, where they are expected to live in the field for up to 48 hours with very little support.

### **DEBATING**

The three premier Schools' Debating Competitions concluded last term. In the English-Speaking Union's School Mace our team of George Tothill and Hassan Sarfraz (both Year 13) fought their way through three qualifying rounds to be one of six teams contesting the East of England Regional Final. They were unable to claim the title despite a spirited defence of the motion to support the use of private military contractors in combat roles, but can be proud of having reached the Regional Finals in two consecutive years.

We were also represented in the Oxford Union's Senior Schools' Competition, this time by three teams: George Tothill and Hassan Sarfraz (Year 13); Conrad Kunadu (Year 12) and Scott Jones (Year 11); Jasper Harmer and Anthony Haiser (both Year 11). The motions, which

were given with 15 minutes' notice for preparation, were reasonably standard fare for this competition – including one on instituting a quota of women MPs and one of allowing schools to select students on the basis of academic ability – but the standard of school debating is rising every year with more good schools fielding multiple teams. Consequently, for only the fourth time in the last 15 years, we did not have a team qualify for the International

In the Cambridge Union Schools'
Competition we again fielded three
teams: Juwon Toyin-Adebanjo (Year 13)
and Scott Jones (Year 11); Conrad Kunadu
and Ross McIntyre (both Year 12); Jasper
Harmer and Anthony Haiser (both Year
11). The short preparation motions were
particularly challenging, including one
which called on women from privileged
backgrounds to forgo any advantage from

positive discrimination programmes. The competition was packed with some of the top teams in the Country, including the England Schools' team. Our pairing of Juwon and Scott - debating together for the first time - were rated the top team from the East of England, and, following an extraordinarily skilful final debate in the Union Chamber on the proposition that "memory-writing" technology should be welcomed, qualified for the National Finals. Unfortunately. Juwon and Scott were unable to participate on Finals' Day in Cambridge due to myself being unwell, a great shame because they would probably have entered as the highestranked of any of the nine WHSB teams to compete at that level in the last 15 years.

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# **TRIPS & VISITS**

### **ISLE OF ARRAN**

24 to 30 June 2017

As part of their Advanced Level geological studies, Year 12 students will undertake their compulsory fieldwork between Saturday 24 June and Friday 30 June 2017 on the Isle of Arran, staying at the Lochranza Field Studies Centre. From this location geologists are able to study a large variety of topics of interest. These include the nature of the rock record and how they were formed, their plate tectonic relationships, fossil content, folding and faulting.

As part of their work, students will collect data for their Year 13 field investigation relating to the opening of the North West Atlantic 65 million years ago, when Scotland separated from Greenland. Isle of Arran is visited by many school and undergraduate geologists as it is a worldrenowned location for the study of the subject. As a result of the visit, students will have a much greater knowledge and understanding of field geology and be able to relate it to their class studies. Also, the students will have developed their transferable skills in numeracy, report writing, problem solving and teamwork within an area of outstanding natural beauty.

# **GREAT WAR BATTLEFIELDS TRIP 2017** 7 to 10 July 2017

This summer sees the 27th annual visit to the Great War Battlefields in France and Belgium, organised by the History Department, with over 90 pupils due to attend. The focus will be on the British and Allied experience of warfare on the Western Front. Pupils will spend one full day around the Belgian town of Ypres, where four major battles were fought, most notoriously the Battle of Passchendaele. Indeed, this year commemorates one hundred years since this Battle, so we expect interest to be heightened

Pupils will spend another full day visiting sites on the Somme Battlefield and learning about the circumstances which preceded 1 July 1916 (the bloodiest day in British military history) and the 60,000 casualties suffered on that day, as well as the significance of the Battle in the context of the wider War.

We look forward to what promises to be an eye-opening, educational visit which will give pupils a valuable insight into the experience of soldiers in the Great War.

We have chosen Aberystwyth as a destination as it is currently the only

University-based field studies centre in the country and as part of the package the students will hear a presentation by a university lecturer, which gives them valuable UCAS experience.

University staff are helping to arrange the fieldwork on each day to ensure the level of terminology and analysis gives the students every opportunity to score highly. The trip will include two days of Human fieldwork (based on the impact of globalisation and urbanisation) and two days of Physical fieldwork (based on glaciation and water infiltration rates).

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# **SLICES OF PI: MATHEMATICS AT WHSB**

# SENIOR MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE (SMC), INTERMEDIATE MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE (IMC) AND JUNIOR MATHEMATICS CHALLENGE (JMC)

On Tuesday 8 November 2016, all members of Year 13, and those studying Pre U Mathematics in Year 12, took the Senior Mathematics Challenge. This year, Oliver Croysdill, William Brookes and Jasen Walker got through to the British Olympiad, all performing well on what are incredibly challenging questions. Alongside these three, Daniel Gilbert, Anuj Patel, Harry Dare, Ryan Lawrence, Lewis Hunt and James Quigley got through to the Senior Kangaroo follow on round, with Anuj Patel scoring a merit on this paper, and the rest performing admirably.

On Thursday 2 February 2017, all members of Year 11 took the IMC. This year, 13 pupils got through to the Pink Kangaroo follow on round; Joseph

Cameron, James Walker, Christopher Chadwick, Kayode Omotoso, Rahul Arora, Harry Degrove, William Allan-Smith, Cameron Heafield, Alasdair Ramsay, Michael Kunadu, Joshua Wood, Peter Banfield and Storm Jackson-Abbott.

In the SMC, 13 pupils achieved a gold certificate, 50 a silver, and 51 a bronze. In the IMC, 15 pupils received a gold certificate, 40 a silver, and 49 a bronze. I would like to congratulate all pupils who took part. The questions posed acted as a superb method of improving students' ability to solve problems. This is a key skill at A Level and GCSE which is often not practised nearly enough by pupils due to the modular nature of the course. The Junior Mathematics Challenge will take place on Thursday 27 April 2017. All

pupils from Year 8 will be entered into this problem-solving competition. In previous years, WHSB has enjoyed a great deal of success in this challenge, and often from those pupils who do not find Mathematics straightforward. The nature of these questions means that those who have an innate ability for problem-solving often gain better grades, regardless of how they are performing academically within the year group.

Last year, 9 pupils got through to the follow on rounds, 21 achieved a gold, 54 a silver and 42 a bronze. We look forward to experiencing a similar degree of success this year. If you wish to prepare or train for the challenge, then please ask your teacher for additional materials, or access the UKMT website to locate past papers.

# DR MATT PRITCHARD TALKS ON MAGICAL MATHS

On Friday 24 February, Dr Pritchard visited WHSB to present a show entitled Magical Maths to our Year 7 pupils. Dr Pritchard's presentation included an awe inspiring and highly engaging array of magic tricks involving the use of mathematics. These tricks included anything from predicting the future, reading minds, sending secret messages


and making objects vanish, all whilst exposing the audience to a surprising amount of mathematics, with topics ranging from shape and symmetry to number patterns. Our pupils enjoyed the experience immensely and hopefully went away with new ways to amaze their friends and families, but also learn some interesting mathematics in the process.

On the same day, Dr Pritchard also delivered a talk to our Middle School and Sixth Form pupils during the evening. The title of the talk was *Something about*  Nothing and it addressed the topic of nothing in Mathematics, approached in a fun and engaging manner, whilst exploring some of the rich mathematics and history that has come about over the question of what exactly is 'nothing'. The talk also covered the highly controversial use of the number zero in ancient civilisation, the philosophy behind nothing, negative numbers, vacuums, the Big Bang and many more interesting points of discussion. It was a fun, engaging and highly informative evening, which our pupils thoroughly enjoyed.



### YEAR 8 TEAM CHALLENGE

On Tuesday 14 March 2017, Mrs
Hammond took a team of four Year 8
pupils to compete in the Year 8 Team
Challenge at Bancroft School. The
team consisted of Sammy Joujou, Jake
Pilkington, Justus Genthe and Nivasan
Loganathan. The team competed in a
series of rounds designed to test their
mental arithmetic and problem-solving
skills, while at the same time working
effectively as a team. They performed
well, ending up 4th place overall in the
competition, and being complemented for
their team work, enthusiasm, hard work
and knowledge of mathematics.



### MENTORING SCHEME

The Junior (Year 7 to 9), Intermediate (Year 10 and 11) and Senior (Year 12 and 13) Mentoring Schemes are up and running. Each month, pupils are given a set of problems which they can work on in their free time, or as extension work in lessons. During the month, the teachers offering these schemes set up times to meet with pupils to discuss these problems. At the end of the month, the teachers conducting these schemes offer solutions to pupils so that they can check their work. Quite often there is more than one way to answer these problems so, alongside celebrating a correct answer, you can also help others understand the way in which you tackled the problem.

These schemes are meant to stretch the more able pupils by offering them a variety of problem-solving challenges. The problems offered in these schemes are similar to those encountered in the JMC, IMC or SMC. These are a fantastic way of showing your ability and commitment in Mathematics so, if you feel you are able to rise to the challenge, then sign up with Mr Doherty for the Junior scheme, Mr Manning for the Intermediate scheme or Mr Dowding for the Senior scheme to get involved.

### STUDENT TUTORING

The Mathematics Department continues to run a successful student to student tutoring scheme over lunch times and break times. If you wish to sign up for this scheme, either as someone who can help mentor another student, or someone who needs help themselves, please see Mr Doherty.

We can accommodate pupils from Year 7 to Year 13 in both Mathematics and Further Mathematics, so if you are having problems with any of your work please do ask for help. The sessions with your mentor are designed to run across the year, but the scheme is flexible to suit your needs. Therefore, if you are having a particularly tough time this term, as there is a lot of work on Algebra, then we can arrange for a mentor for a short period of time instead.

### **MYMATHS CHALLENGE**

The MyMaths Challenge continues to run in Years 7, 8 and 9. In Years 7 and 8 you must complete five level 5, three level 6, or two level 7 tasks to be awarded with a House point. In Year 9, you must complete five level 6, three level 7, and two level 8 tasks. The House points are awarded at the end of the year and particular note is made of those pupils who have made impressive progress. This is an easy way to earn House points and improve in Mathematics. You can choose exactly what tasks you wish to complete.

### **HELP CLUBS**

The Department offers Key Stage 3 and 4 Help Clubs, running every Monday and Thursday in M2, and Key Stage 5 Help Clubs every Tuesday and Friday in M6. These Help Clubs are designed to support pupils who are finding difficulty in a certain aspect of their work. Pupils are welcome to bring along a problem or topic with which they are struggling and arrange one to one support from a teacher or Sixth Form student tutor. It might be that you only need to come for 5 minutes,


# MUSICOLOGY SEMINAR: BEETHOVEN'S SUPERPOWER

Tuesday 9 May, 3.45-4.45pm

How can a composer write music as successfully as Beethoven without being able to hear a note? That was the question asked by Richard Wagner in his essay 'Beethoven' written in 1870, 100 years after the birth of the composer. Wagner's answer is simple: Beethoven's deafness was his greatest strength, allowing him to see beyond the world as we know it to

access music in its purest sense. To what extent is Wagner's answer accurate? Did Beethoven really have a metaphysical superpower?

This seminar follows on from last term's seminar on the development of the Russian national style, and once again focuses on the historical and personal circumstances behind famous composers and their works. This seminar is free and is recommended to students from Years 9–13 with an interest in the history of music.



### THE PHILHARMONIA ORCHESTRA AT THE ROYAL FESTIVAL HALL

Wednesday 21 June, 4.30pm



Pupils, staff, parents and friends of the School are invited to join the Music Department on a trip to the Royal Festival Hall in London to see the world-class Philharmonia Orchestra perform an exciting programme of music. The evening will start with Lyadov's *Kikimora*, telling the story of a malevolent spirit in the wilds of Russia, followed by pianist Denis Kozhukhin playing Rachmaninov's *Piano Concerto No 2*, featuring a famous and beautifully lyrical second movement.

The concert will end with the bombastic *Symphony No 5* by Shostakovich. This is one of those rare pieces of music that

is almost more famous for the history behind it than for the music itself. The myth and legend that surrounds this piece, concerning Shostakovich's justifiable fear of being abducted and executed by the soldiers of Stalin's regime, leads the listener to attach a story to the music whose veracity continues to be debated. Nevertheless, this is a thrilling and, at times, devastating piece of music that is required listening for any musician.

Such training sessions should enable our pupils to improve their performance and progress.

The Physical Education Department is looking forward to the athletic matches that are confirmed in the Department's summer calendar. We shall be competing against schools such as Brentwood, John Fisher, Woodcote and Whitgift. Clearly these schools have a good athletic reputation, and I know the pupils from WHSB are looking forward to competing against them and showing just how talented and determined they are.



### **RUGBY**

WHSB hosted its first Rugby 7s tournament for Year 8 teams during the latter part of the spring term. It was well attended by local schools and some wellestablished rugby schools from further afield. The WHSB team's performance was excellent. The team defeated Campion School, a reputable rugby school, in the early rounds and finished in second place overall, narrowly losing to The King John School. However our team rose to the challenge to achieve second place in the group, narrowly losing to New Hall School in the deciding game. Finishing in second place was enough to take WHSB through to the quarterfinal stage as the highest try scorers. Woodlands School were our opponents in the quarterfinal match; a game which WHSB dominated. We took on Campion School in the semi-final and, in a competitive game, WHSB scored in the final moments to achieve a place in the final. Again the WHSB team faced our group rivals New Hall School. The first half ended with the teams evenly matched, having scored two tries each. Unfortunately, New Hall School had the



better of the second half, and despite a spirited performance from WHSB, the game ended with New Hall School as the winners. This was a highly enjoyable day of rugby and we would like to commend the outstanding performances of Jack Shea, Guy Rainforth, Josh Ogunfolaju and Damope Akinyemi.

Timi Ibinola, Isaiah Akinlabi and Hamza Termezi led from the front as the Under 12 side gave a spirited performance in their Essex 7s tournament. After dominating the group games the WHSB team once again drew New Hall School in the quarterfinals. New Hall School had an excellent team and ultimately triumphed. However, a week later the WHSB team made the short journey to Westcliff Rugby Club where we defeated all the local opposition in the Borough Championships. The pupils represented the School with pride and were deserving champions.

The Sixth Form side claimed third place in the Essex Rugby 7s competition at the end of March, beating Southend High School for Boys with the last play of the game

The Under 15 side is to be commended on reaching the semi-final of the Essex Cup in the 15 aside version of the game. Ultimately, the team suffered a narrow defeat to Robert Clack School. Unfortunately the Under 16 team, having defeated Robert Clack School in the Essex Cup, then lost to Colchester Royal Grammar School and did not progress from the group stage of the competition.

The Physical Education Department is looking forward to next season and the organisation of our Saturday programme for next year is already underway.
