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FROM THE DESK OF THE HEADMASTER

WELCOME TO THE NEW ACADEMIC YEAR

As we look forward to the calendar of activities and events for the Autumn Term 2023, I am pleased to welcome you to the start of this new term, and to bring you up to date with some exciting developments which have taken place during July and August.

I would also like to welcome to the School our new pupils in Year 7 and the Lower Sixth, and to wish them and their parents well for their first academic year at WHSB. I hope you will find the following news and updates helpful, by way of further introduction to the School, and that this edition of *The Westcliff Diary* will assist in also outlining some important information which should support you as you settle into the WHSB community.

Extra-Curricular Activities and Events

On 8 July, it was my great pleasure to attend the ESAA National Athletics Final, this year in Chelmsford, to see the WHSB Inter Boys Athletics Team perform to an outstanding level. The team achieved

second place in England in this challenging Final, beaten only by an impressive Dartford Grammar School team.

Our talented team of athletes achieved an astonishing number of personal bests in their events and, together as a team, achieved a School record in this competition by scoring 588 points. The following pupils from WHSB not only achieved personal best performances, but in doing so, set new School records.

- Asaph Lawal: 13.69m Shot Put
- Samuel Achogbuo: 41.46m Discus
- Oba Ayegbe: 52.58m Javelin

This is the second time our pupils have performed at the Fringe, the first being in 2018, when they delivered superb performances of Waiting for Ofsted, a play written by Mr Jeffreys, receiving outstanding reviews. Followers of School news will also be aware that, just before we ended the Summer Term, our Year 8 Cricket Team won the Borough League Cup, doing so with an unbeaten run. This followed this team's success last year when, then in Year 7, they also won this competition.

The WHSB Year 7 Cricket Team has also won the Borough League Cup in their competition this year, remaining unbeaten, and we are also proud that our superb under-13 Cricket Team (pupils in Years 8 and 7), succeeded in winning the Under-13 Borough Cup in a very close final match.

This team will now compete this month in the Final of the Under-13 Essex Plate Competition, and we wish them well.

I never cease to be amazed at the determination and success of our pupils in achieving at the highest level in a wide range of extra-curricular activities and events. Regrettably, it is not possible to acknowledge all of those achievements in this short introduction, but during the final weeks of last term we were celebrating pupils' achievements in so many areas, ranging from the Duke of Edinburgh Awards, to the promotions and awards made during the Combined Cadet Force Passing Off Parade; from the Anthea Bell Young Translators National Languages Prizes, to success in the national Warhammer Tournament, and much more besides.

I congratulate all our pupils on their participation and success in the very many extra-curricular activities with which they are involved.

School Buildings: Summer Projects

We continue to take advantage of the quieter weeks during the summer holiday break to carry out upgrades and refurbishments to our School buildings and facilities.

During July and August this year, we have at last been able to fund and complete the project to replace the East Toilet Block providing some excellent new toilet facilities on the East Side of the Main School. These facilities have now been brought within the Main School Building, and therefore pupils have access to

pleasant, modern and safe toilet facilities which are much closer to hand.

We are also pleased that we were able to extend this project to also include upgraded changing facilities for Sixth Form girls who wish to participate in sport. Previously, their changing facilities were inadequate and, following several unsuccessful attempts to secure funding from the Department for Education to provide improved facilities, the School has worked hard to identify funding through its own resources to ensure these improved facilities are now available.

I would like to thank those staff who continued to work at the School during the summer holiday period, and indeed those parents and pupils visiting our Uniform Shop while these projects were underway. These important developments could not take place without a great deal of dust and noise, and your patience in this regard was very much appreciated.

Further exciting developments have also taken place in the School Hall, with the complete replacement of the original Hall floor. This was a major project, necessitating the closure of the School Building for certain weeks during the summer break, and members of our support staff were relocated to the Technology Block during those times. Due to the size and disruptive nature of this project, whilst most of the work could be completed during the summer, it was necessary for us to also set aside two weeks at the start of term for the completion of this project. I am pleased to report that this project has gone to plan and we are looking forward to re-opening the School Hall on Monday 18 September.

Significant refurbishment to the majority of classrooms in the Main School Building has also been carried out to ensure pupils and staff continue to enjoy a pleasant working environment. In addition, we have completed the refurbishment of two classrooms in the East Basement and opened up a transit route along this corridor to ease pressure on the School corridors during busy times.

Considerable work too has been carried out on the upgrading of our ICT Network. This project has involved the installation of new wireless access points to improve connectivity, as well as replacing our servers and several core switches. Further improvements will take place during the first part of the autumn term. This project will provide pupils and staff with a faster and more reliable School ICT Network.

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The Centenary Room

In July, we were pleased to hold the Official Opening of our Centenary Room, which commemorates the School's Centenary Year in 2020. With thanks to the support of so many in our School community throughout the challenging periods of lockdown during 2020 and 2021, we continued to mark and celebrate the School's Centenary Year with a number of special projects and events, beginning, of course, with the spectacular Centenary Gala Ball and Launch at the Cliff's Pavilion on 1 February 2020. I am delighted that some photographs of that wonderful occasion are displayed in our Centenary Room.

The rapid and devastating spread and impact of the Covid-19 pandemic forced us to cancel or delay some of the special events we had planned for our Centenary Year but, as I noted in my speech at the Official Opening of the Centenary Room in July, the resilience, creativity and determination of our pupils and staff ensured the celebrations went on, albeit through remote means or alternative projects.

Following the long periods of remote teaching, which extended into 2021, with the need to shift our focus towards settling pupils back into the School and dealing with the aftermath of the lockdowns, it made sense to put certain projects on hold, one such project being the Centenary Room. However, we were delighted to return to those plans in 2023 and the room is now complete and officially open.

Aside from a dedicated space to display artifacts and materials collected since the School's opening in 1920, this room will double as a meeting room and a special resource for teaching, for example in History. Further details of our Official Opening in July, together with some photographs, are included in the Old Westcliffian Association section of this edition (pages 68-73). I would like to record my thanks to Mr Jon Gershinson, former Chair of the Governing Board, who kindly joined us for that event to officially open this new resource.

ANNUAL SPEECH DAY 2023

Thursday 9 November 2023



Our annual Speech Day provides pupils, parents and staff with an opportunity to celebrate the achievements of pupils throughout the School during the past academic year. The evening is a compulsory attendance for all students in Year 11, and the Lower and Upper Sixth, and we anticipate that more than 900 pupils, parents, staff and other guests will be in attendance.

This year, we are delighted to welcome Sir Graham Brady as our Guest of Honour for this special evening.

Sir Graham has served as the Member of Parliament (MP) for Altrincham and Sale West since 1997, following an early career in public relations and policy. A member of the Conservative Party, he has been Chairman of the 1922 Committee since 2010, other than for a brief period in 2019. Sir Graham served as a Shadow Minister under four Conservative leaders before resigning in 2007 in protest at David Cameron's opposition to grammar schools. On 1 December 2010, Sir Graham was voted Backbencher of the Year by *The Spectator* at its annual parliamentary awards.

During his tenure as 1922 Committee Chairman, Sir Graham has overseen the election of three Conservative Party leaders and Prime Ministers (Theresa May, Liz Truss and Rishi Sunak), and votes of no confidence in Theresa May and Boris Johnson.

Sir Graham was a grammar school pupil himself, being educated at Altrincham Grammar School for Boys, before reading Law at the University of Durham. He was highly active in politics as a student, serving as Chairman of the Durham University Conservative Association (1987–1988 academic year) and being one of six students elected to represent Durham at the annual NUS conference.

Sir Graham is a prominent supporter of grammar schools, believing they open

opportunities for large numbers of bright children from families who cannot access fee-paying schools, addressing those potential inequalities surrounding educational privilege.

We look forward to welcoming Sir Graham Brady to Westcliff High School for Boys in November, and to celebrating our pupils' impressive achievement.

SCHOOL ATTENDANCE

Once again, I would like to remind parents and pupils of the importance of full and sustained attendance at School each day, and to emphasise the impact of the continuity of education on a pupil's attainment.

The majority of our pupils continue to maintain superb attendance records and, as I explain each year, they, their parents and the staff at WHSB take appreciable pride in the commitment and determination of all involved in maintaining strong attendance records.

Nationally, it is reported that records of attendance since the months of lockdown during Covid-19 have fallen. Although I am pleased to say that attendance at WHSB has generally remained strong, we have noted a dip in the attendance of particular pupils and such a pattern must be avoided at all costs.

Attendance is closely monitored by our Pastoral Teams and we continue to evaluate and follow-up any concerns. Each year, without fail, our data indicates a strong correlation between absence and lower levels of progress. It is one of the most significant variables affecting a pupil's academic progress and final grades. An absence of just one day can present a pupil with significant challenges in catching up on missed work whilst endeavouring to keep up in lessons, as the pace of lessons is fast.

There is, of course, sometimes an exceptional case to the general rule, however I wish to remind parents that requests for leave of absence for holidays during term time will not be granted. Given its impact on educational performance, maintaining outstanding levels of attendance for every pupil remains a priority for the School. It is also important that parents and School are as one in emphasising this message to pupils.

I am grateful to parents for their continuing support in prioritising full attendance in order to maximise the opportunity for their son/daughter in reaching his/her full potential.

PUBLIC HEALTH CONCERN

The health and wellbeing of our pupils is paramount and is at the root of many of the School's Assemblies, Form time discussions, PHSEE and other lessons, and, of course, our general approach to participation in the wider life of the School.

We also like to update parents on topical issues, one such issue being the serious matter of drug taking and substance misuse amongst young people. Clearly, this is a serious problem in our wider society and, in this regard, it is important that the School and parents work together to do everything possible to keep children safe from drugs.

'Vaping' and the rise of E Vapes has become a significant public health issue, and agencies across Essex, including the Police, have been working closely together as we remain increasingly concerned about the rise of 'vaping' amongst young people in our county and nationally.

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Of particular concern is the use of Vape Pens, Liquids and Oils, and THC. Some of these are currently legal, whilst others are not, and it is difficult to distinguish between the two. Synthetic illegal substances can often be odourless, difficult to detect due to the nature of chemicals used, and can be innocently named. Regrettably, it appears fashionable for young people to experiment with vaping, particularly at parties or whilst in park areas and socialising with their friends.

Sharing a 'vape' with another person is particularly dangerous as, often, the person has no idea what he or she is actually inhaling. The risks are also heightened as some substances can cause extreme behaviours and reactions. You will, no doubt, be aware that the national press covers distressing news on a regular basis of young people either losing their life or being seriously affected by drugs misuse.

Vape pens, liquids, oils and other such paraphernalia are readily available in the

market; therefore, it is important that parents remain alert to this fact, and the dangers that can present. Usage can result in noticeable changes in behaviour, sleep or eating patterns and, should you be concerned, we advise that you to speak to your child about your concerns and seek support as may be necessary. A LEVEL AND GCSE EXAMINATION RESULTS 2023

I would like to congratulate our students and staff on their outstanding outcomes in the public examinations this summer. Whilst there had been much publicity prior to the release of the results concerning a national fall in marks, we are proud that our students achieved superb results and we have much to celebrate.

It was a splendid year for A Level results at the School, with 15% of entries graded A* and 47% of all entries graded A* or A. A remarkable 74% of all entries were graded A*, A or B. There were many superb individual performances, with 31 students achieving three or more A*/A grades, including six students who secured 4 A* grades. Many more delighted students achieved the grades necessary to enable them to take their next step forward at their first-choice university or other chosen direction.

At GCSE, we are also celebrating particularly strong performance. Having achieved 79% of all grades at 9-7, the results achieved by these students are amongst the School's best ever GCSE results. Over a quarter (26%) of examinations were graded 9. We have many pupils who have performed at an exceptionally high level. 73% of pupils achieved 8 or more 9-7 grades, and 29% of pupils achieved 12 9-7 grades. A remarkable 47% of pupils achieved 8 or more 9-8 grades.

This is an exceptional performance from both the A Level and GCSE cohorts, with students rising brilliantly to the many challenges presented throughout the pandemic years. Their excellent results reflect the hard work invested and their resilience and determination in the face of those challenging circumstances.



I give all these students my best wishes and good luck for the year ahead, and I would like to thank the staff at WHSB for the superb teaching and support they have provided for these students throughout; they too should be proud of these remarkable achievements.

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PASTORAL SYSTEM: AN OVERVIEW FOR YEAR 7 PARENTS

A very warm welcome to families new to our School community and we hope that your child will be very happy at Westcliff High School for Boys.

For those who are unsure as to how the Pastoral Care system is configured here at WHSB, there follows a brief overview.

Our Pastoral Care system is split into three divisions:

- Lower School which consists of Years 7 to 9:
- Middle School which consists of Years 10 and 11; and
- Sixth Form.

Each Division is led by a Director of School who oversees a team of Progress Leaders, Form Tutors and a Pastoral Tutor. These teams of staff remain with the pupils throughout each Division, in order to ensure stability during the first three years, and again during the GCSE years, and then at Sixth Form. This also enables our teams to be focused on the age-appropriate needs of their pupils. In the case of the Lower School, Mr A Baggs is the Director of School.

Each Division is also overseen by a member of the Senior Team:

- Mr J Bleakley, Senior Master of Lower School;
- Mr W Williams, Deputy Headteacher (Middle School); and
- Mr A Dean, Senior Master Sixth Form.

Each Pastoral Team has two main functions, the first being the personal development and welfare of the pupils. Within each pastoral office there is a Pastoral Tutor who is always on hand in that office to field queries from pupils or parents. The Progress Leader oversees his or her Year group, in terms of the pupils' welfare, and also oversees the work of the Form Tutors, because each Year group is broken down into Form groups. Form Tutors


see their pupils twice each day for Registration, whilst also holding a weekly Form period with them, also supporting our PSHEE programme.

The second function of the Pastoral Teams is the academic monitoring work in connection with individual pupils. The Progress Leader reviews the academic progress of each pupil when the Reports are produced either two or three times per year, according to the Year group. Reports for pupils in the Lower School are produced three times per year. The Progress Leader and his/her team provides support and encouragement for their pupils, implementing various types of support and intervention as may be necessary, working with parents and the pupil to help ensure each pupil realises his or her full potential.

This has been a popular initiative in recent years and we have many superb Library Ambassadors. For any pupils interested in becoming a Library Ambassador, they should speak to the Library staff about putting their name forward, and also listen out for information in the Daily Notices this term.

THE SCHOOL LIBRARY

During the last few years, the School Library has undergone a number of improvements and updates in order to provide pupils with an effective and enjoyable study space where they can work and read independently outside of the classroom. It provides a quiet working space which must be respected by all pupils when they are using this resource.

The School Library opens at 8.00am to allow pupils to work before School starts, and it remains open until 5.45pm for pupils who wish to complete their homework after School finishes for the day. During the main part of the School day, the Library is open to all pupils at break time and at lunchtime, so that they can use the space to work and exchange their library books. During





Pupils join Westcliff High School for Boys with the aim of unlocking their potential. They want to develop their intellectual curiosity and global awareness, to become lifelong learners and effective communicators. Our pupils want to prepare themselves for a happy and successful future. There is no better way for them to achieve these aims than by becoming a Lifelong Reader. Extensive research has shown that reading provides a host of benefits. Reading improves skills of writing and comprehension, general knowledge, empathy, and develops a better understanding of other cultures. Being a Lifelong Reader grants you important cultural capital, and being a good reader makes you a good learner. But these are not the reasons a Lifelong Reader reads.

Reading is one of the most enjoyable and enriching hobbies a person can have. There is nothing like picking up a page-turner or finding an amazing new series of books to steam through. Lifelong Readers read because they love it. The aim of the Lifelong Readers Initiative is to instil a love of reading within the pupils of our School. Starting this year with Year 7 pupils, we will lend three books to each pupil, one for each term. The books chosen are from the literary canon and have been picked for thei variety of themes and topics, and because they are challenging.





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SAFEGUARDING

Online Safety

As parents will be aware, the School takes its safeguarding responsibilities exceptionally seriously. Parents will be aware that there has been significant media coverage of late in relation to online safety and the School has also seen a rise in the number of safeguarding cases involving inappropriate use of the internet. Online safety concerns can broadly be categorised in 4Cs, namely content, contact, conduct and commerce (see infographic on page 13).

As a School, we seek to protect and educate our students in relation to online safety in a number of ways. The School's computer network uses a filtering provider that blocks harmful and inappropriate websites whilst we also monitor the searches of students to ensure their safety and flag any potential risk factors. In addition, matters relating to online safety are covered extensively within the Computer Science curriculum and within our Personal Development programme through PSHEE lessons, Form periods and Assemblies.

At the start of the new academic year, there are four areas (fake profile, grooming, pornography and privacy setting) which we would like to bring to the attention of parents. Parents are encouraged to open a dialogue with their son/daughter about these issues. We have also provided some links to other websites where further information and guidance can be sought.

Fake profiles

It is important for young people to understand that, unfortunately, not everyone online is who they say they are. Parents can support our work at School by explaining to their son/daughter that that in some cases social media profiles may be people posing as someone they are not (such as an adult posing as a child) or may be bots (which are automated software programs designed to create and control fake social media accounts). In order to potentially spot such fake profiles, young people should be aware and look out for: profile pictures that do not look right (for example, of a celebrity or object), accounts with no followers or thousands of followers or a public figure who does not have a verified account.

Grooming

Parents should be aware that young people who spend time online are exposing themselves to different types of grooming including radicalisation, child sexual abuse and exploitation, gangs (county lines) and financial exploitation (so called money mules). It would be beneficial to discuss with your son/daughter the matter of boundaries in friendships with peers, families and with others. Parents should be aware of the key indicators of grooming behaviour as outlined by the NSPCC.

Signs a child is being groomed may include:

- Sudden changes in behaviour, such as spending more or less time online:
- Spending more time away or going missing from home or school;
- Being secretive about how they are spending their time, including when using online devices;
- Having unexplained gifts, big or small;
- Misusing alcohol and/or drugs;
- Having a friendship or relationship with a much older person;
- Developing sexual health problems;
- Using sexual language you would not expect them to know;
- Seeming upset or withdrawn;
- Mental health problems.

Signs of grooming can easily be mistaken for 'typical' teenage behaviour, but you may notice unexplained changes in behaviour or personality or inappropriate behaviour for their age. Parents can access the National Crime Agency's *ThinkUKnow* website (https://www.thinkuknow.co.uk/) for further information on keeping children safe from sexual abuse and exploitation. In addition, if you are concerned that your child may be being groomed online, you can report the matter to the Police (by calling 999 in an emergency or 111), CEOP (Child Exploitation and Online Protection Command), https://www.ceop.police.uk/ceop-reporting/ and/or local child protection services. The School can also offer support and guidance and you can contact either Mr Williams (Designated Safeguarding Lead) or Mr Bleakley (Deputy Designated Safeguarding Lead).

Pornography

Whilst this may be an uncomfortable subject to discuss with your son/daughter, parents are encouraged to reiterate the message that sexually explicit material available on the internet and through social media presents a distorted picture of sexual behaviours. Viewing pornography can lead to skewed beliefs about sex and in some circumstances can normalise violent sexual behaviour. Young people should understand that, unfortunately. not all people featured in pornographic material are doing so willingly, such as revenge porn or people trafficked into sex work. It is important that we talk to children about the sexualised content they see, including online pornography, to help them interpret and critique this information and to help them develop healthy and positive attitudes towards sex, relationships and their own body. You may find the UK Safer Internet Centre's guide, Talking to Young People about Pornography, useful (https:// saferinternet.org.uk/online-issue/pornography).

Privacy settings

In all online communications, young people must understand the different strategies for staying safe when communicating with others, especially people they do not know or have never met. As part of your conversations with your son/daughter, it would be helpful to discuss and explain that communicating safely online and protecting your privacy and data is important regardless of who you are communicating with. Young people should be aware of the risks of giving out addresses, phone numbers or email addresses to people they do not know or arranging to meet someone you have not met before.

As a parent, you play a key role in helping your child to stay safe online. The UK Safer Internet Centre contains a wealth of information and guides for parents and offers some sound advice on how to start a conversation about these matters (see page 13).

Risks such as online gambling, inappropriate advertising, phishing and or financial scams. If you feel your pupils, students or staff are at risk, please report it to the Anti-Phishing Working Group.

Ask your children to tell you about the sites they like to visit and what they enjoy doing online.

What games do you and your friends like to play online? Can you show me the websites you visit the most? Shall we play your favourite game online together?

Ask them about how they stay safe online.

What tips do they have for you, and where did they learn them? What is OK and not OK to share?

Ask them if they know where to go for help.

Where can they go to find the safety advice, privacy settings and how to report or block on the services they use?

Think about how you each use the internet.

What more could you do to use the internet together? Are there activities that you could enjoy as a family?

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YEAR 7 ROAD SAFETY EVENT

Thursday 14 September 2023

This is an innovative, exciting, and truly unique sixty-minute Theatre in Education project that links to the PSHEE curriculum. A contemporary, fast-paced and hard-hitting play, using live drama, video footage and music to tell the story of three friends who are forced to face up to the real consequences of their reckless behaviour on the busy road they use to and from school. The play is followed by a twenty-minute interactive workshop with the Year group, and a ten-minute evaluation for all audience members.

This highly engaging, multi-media theatre event promotes key road safety messages to pupils in Key Stage 3 and will:

- Raise awareness of the danger of roadside distractions from music, phones and friends.
- Help pupils to identify and cope with peer influence and peer pressure.
- Promote safe, responsible and positive behaviour amongst pupils on the home to school journey.

According to a recent review, this is "the most impactful short presentation I have seen; excellent question and answer session. Thought-provoking, well planned and executed".

On Friday 15 September 2023, Year 8 will be taking part in a Science Day as part of Enrichment Day. The aim of the day is to allow pupils in Year 8 to develop their scientific thinking and practical skills. These are vital skills for any young scientist, which equip pupils for greater success within their wider scientific studies at School.

Activities for the day will include understanding the Scientific Method, engaging in practical tasks, and conducting research tasks.

The Scientific Method has formed the backbone of scientific development since at least the 17th century. Within this activity, pupils will aim to:

- Understand what the Scientific Method is;
- Draw scientific diagrams accurately;
- Identify hazards, risks and controls;
- Apply the Scientific Method to practical experiments in order to be more robust and objective; and
- Understand that the Scientific Method is important for the global scientific community.

In the practical tasks, pupils will aim to:

- Handle practical equipment safely and correctly;
- Work safely in the laboratory;
- Work collaboratively with other young scientists;
- Learn new areas of Science beyond the scope of the examination curriculum;
- Apply their knowledge to the wider world; and
- Be more confident in conducting practical experiments.

The ability to conduct research is an important transferable skill, whether that be for a project or for one's own personal interests. Within this activity, pupils will aim to:

- Be more computer literate, including using basic software such as Microsoft Word;
- Understand how to research effectively;
- Understand how we determine which sources of information are reliable and which less so; and
- Use sources to influence their own work, rather than adopting a passive 'copy and paste' approach.

Year 9 Duxford Trip

On 15 September, pupils in the Year 9 cohort will again have the opportunity to visit the airfield and aircraft collection at Duxford, near Cambridge, part of the Imperial War Museum. This is a world-class collection of aircraft, mostly military, along with the Royal Anglian Regiment Museum, at a WWII airfield that still retains a number of its original features. It will give pupils newly arrived into Year 9 an opportunity to put into perspective their historical studies of WWII by seeing some of the technological developments leading up to, and during, the Second World War. Pupils will also be able to examine the technological progress from the early days of flight up to supersonic transport and highaltitude reconnaissance.

A number of ground-breaking aircraft are represented, including:

- Concorde pre-production MSN 101 with its flight-test equipment still installed;
- Several Spitfires, some of which are air-worthy, alongside its nemesis the Messerschmitt Bf-109, and pupils will be able to hear the stories of some of the people involved in crucial roles and events of the Second World War;
- More modern aircraft and helicopters, such as the Avro Vulcan and York, Shorts Sunderland, English Electric Lightning, Hawker Hunter, Westland Wessex and Sea King; and
- American aircraft, including A10 strike aircraft and SR71 Blackbird, alongside a B-52 bomber.

In previous years, groups have been treated to flying displays by Spitfires and a Messerschmitt, other aircraft movements and aircraft maintenance, and restoration projects in progress. We are grateful to the Imperial War Museum, who make available this type of opportunity to school groups free of charge, reducing the overall costs to that of transportation.

However, the Award is more than just the Expedition, with the sections for Skills, Volunteering and Physical activities playing an equally important part. These sections offer pupils an opportunity to stretch themselves in many disciplines. Year 9 pupils will have the opportunity to apply for a place in January, and should apply bearing in mind the full scope and breadth of the Award's requirements.

Sizewell Trip

Students will be studying nuclear power station design as part of their A Level in Physics, so visiting and touring a working nuclear power station will be a tremendously beneficial experience for them. As part of the visit, students will attend a lecture about how nuclear power stations operate, and will have a tour of the facility. They will also visit the turbine room and see, and hear, the enormous turbines spinning at 3000 rpm and transferring enough energy to supply 3.4 million homes on average (nearly every home in the East of England).

YEAR 11 ROAD SAFETY EVENT

Wednesday 20 September 2023

'Dead End' is designed to help young people to engage with the topic of Road Safety from the perspective of both driver and passenger. The play explores both causes and consequences of Road Traffic Incidents. It portrays the horrific consequences of three characters' actions on the roads, dealing with the following situations:

- The story of Molly who, after one night out with Harrison, then has to deal with the aftermath of grave injury to herself, and come to terms with both her actions and the death of a friend:
- The story of Harrison, who crashed the car Molly was in and claimed he was not at fault, believing that he could take drink and drugs but still drive. As the dialogue develops, attempts by Harrison and Molly to deny responsibility are turned on their head. Only then do we realise Harrison's fate that night:
- The story of Tony, who caused death due to distraction. This
 explores from Tony's perspective the causes for the crash in
 graphic detail, along with the pain of responsibility for the
 death of a pedestrian as the result of distraction and lack of
 concentration whilst driving.

Delivered through incredibly powerful monologues and interspersed with theatrical action and imagery via a projection screen, the audience is guided powerfully through the key messages. We see the build-up to, and consequences of, the crashes.

Carefully designed for a Year 11 age group, the performance uses a 'Talking Heads' style approach, with graphic descriptions of the accidents and the emotional scars. This performance has been particularly effective as a means of communicating powerfully with Year 11 pupils, who have proved highly receptive to this more sophisticated and emotive approach.

The performance is only one half of the learning experience. Lasting thirty minutes, it moves directly into a related workshop which lasts a further thirty minutes. The workshop will help our pupils to consolidate and clarify all the issues raised in the play, question the actions and motivations of the characters, and consider what they themselves might do differently in real life.

It is the combination of engaging theatre and an interactive approach that creates such a powerful learning experience and empowers young people to make sensible decisions around their own and others' road safety.

We are aware that this play may be distressing for some pupils. If you have concerns about your child participating in this event, please contact the Middle School Pastoral Office in advance.

MENTAL HEALTH INFORMATION **EVENING**

Thursday 21 September 2023, 7.30pm - 9.00pm

The increasing prominence of Mental Health as part of a holistic understanding of our general health is a welcome development. Equally, its increased prominence is accompanied by historic pressures on mental health services and unprecedented demand for those services.



The School continues to direct considerable resource towards mental health support for those who need it, and has revisited the entirety of its PSHEE and Pastoral provision to ensure that our pupils understand this important area. We want to help pupils understand how they can maintain good mental health, as well as addressing issues that may be detrimental to their mental health should they arise. Mr Bleakley (Senior Master Lower School) and Mr Dean (Senior Master Sixth Form) are our qualified Senior Mental Health Leads at WHSB and, as such, oversee the arrangements for mental health provision within the School.

As part of our provision in this area, we invite all pupils, parents and staff to attend our Mental Health Information Evening.

During the evening we will consider the following areas:

- Maintenance of good mental health and protective factors; • Distinguishing when the normal 'ups and downs' of mood become a mental health problem:
- Identifying sources of help and strategies for self-help; and
- Harmful practices that can damage mental health (including social media abuse, links between technology and poor mental health, sleep and social interactions).

There will be opportunity for questions to be addressed at the end of the session.

- Mechanisms for support in and out of School.

All Year 9 pupils are expected to attend this event, and we invite all parents of Year 9 pupils to attend too.

The report consists of a single numerical grade (1-4) and represents an attitudinal indicator (1 = excellent start and highly suitable choice, 4 = very poor start and potentially unsuitable subject choice).

Subject teachers may comment further on student suitability for a particular course where required. If necessary, your son/daughter should talk to the Sixth Form Pastoral Office for further advice and support. The issuing of the Phase 1 report represents the final opportunity to process subject changes, ensuring that all students have a combination of subjects that best suits their interests and potential.

THE SCHOOL COUNCIL



After being a member of the School Council in the Lower School, I was keen to get involved again as a Sixth Form student. I wanted to work with my peers to contribute suggestions to help our School community develop for the benefit of all pupils.

The School Council is an excellent way for the whole School community to be involved

in helping to shape the future of the School. It is very important that we can give positive feedback on what we are grateful for, as well as making suggestions for how things can be improved even further. The Council is formed of representatives from each Form, culminating in approximately twenty members per Year group. Each Year group has its own set of three 'Celebrations' and three 'Suggestions for Development'. This format ensures all Year groups have an equal say in presenting their ideas and opinions, an important component in ensuring that the School continues to flourish and thrive. Since the School Council changed its structure in January 2023, we have conducted one collection of ideas, involving three 'Celebrations' of the school (which last term were our School's wonderful canteen and Sixth Form café staff, subject mentoring available for all Year groups, and the extra-curricular options present at the School) and three 'Suggestions for Development'.

An important part of contributing to the School Council is the need to be practical about our suggestions and understand the limitations that there may be to having them implemented, whether these be logistical or financial. I am sure we would all love an Olympic sized swimming pool onsite! But to be taken seriously, we understand that our suggestions need to be feasible as well as beneficial for all.

One aspect of the Student Council that I really enjoy is the programme of debates held during Form time, when the whole Form gets involved with debating ideas and deciding what we would like to put forward. Ms Niedziela has been very supportive in her role of Head of the Lower Sixth School Council. She listens to each Form's 'Celebrations' and 'Suggestions', and she works with us to choose whose ideas will be put forward to the Headmaster.

Last term, Maxi Rowe and Mobolu Olowoyeye met with the Headmaster to discuss the Council's proposals. After receiving feedback from the Headmaster, we then had a final meeting that term to evaluate our work and prepare for the next term's

meetings and plans. Maxi and Mobolu spoke confidently and with great conviction, and the Headmaster declared himself impressed with the Council's efforts that term.

Consequently, the Headmaster visited the whole of our Year group in the Westcliff Theatre to address and thank the Lower Sixth for its collaboration and communication with the School. After hearing back from the Headmaster and gaining valuable feedback, I and other members of the Council were pleased to be told by our peers that they felt they had been heard, had their ideas valued and felt fairly represented by the Council. This was a great feeling, and as a Council we were pleased that we had achieved this and helped ensure that a fair system to deliver an active student voice was an established part of the WHSB community.

Last summer term, the six new ideas were proposed to the Headmaster by myself and Maya Garande-Thompson. We are very eager and excited to be able to present our most recent 'Suggestions' and 'Celebrations', with these including an appreciation of the new Peer Mentoring scheme overseen by Mrs Revell and Mr Lilley (ensuring a stronger relationship between Upper and Lower Schools, and allowing further support for those who would like it from the younger Year groups). We also wish to celebrate those charity events that have been run this year by the Charity Committee, including Teacher Five-a-Side Football and the Teacher Sumo Wrestling Event. Furthermore, we also proposed the ideas of combining Sixth Form breadth studies with PSHEE in order to maximise our private study time, a happy coincidence which aligned with the Headmaster's decision to make that change. We also proposed pulling forward the Upper Sixth prefect to Lower Sixth prefect change over in order to facilitate more time for A-Level examination revision. It was a pleasure to propose these ideas for development, and even more pleasing to see how well they were received by Miss Fairfax and the Headmaster. The School Council is a vital aspect of maintaining student-teacher collaboration and ensuring that all pupils from all Year groups feel they are heard and valued in the WHSB community.

If anyone is thinking of getting involved with the School Council in the future, I thoroughly recommend it. The skills that you will learn, such as creating, debating, negotiating and compromising, will be excellent preparation for the working world. I feel very proud to be a part of this vital organisation and look forward to sharing our future achievements with you.


HOMEWORK AND PREPARING FOR ASSESSMENTS, AND THE REPORTING SCHEDULE

Advice and guidance on managing homework and revision, how to use reports to check on progress, and what parents should look out for when receiving a report

Homework, Assessment and Reports

At the start of each academic year, pupils in Years 7 to 11 are provided with a Homework Schedule indicating how much time they should be spending on each piece of homework they receive (25 minutes in Year 7, increasing to 35 minutes by Year 11), and on which night they should complete each piece. The night specified for each subject may not correspond to a day on which they have a lesson in a particular subject, but it has been chosen to ensure that the workload is fairly distributed across the week. The Sixth Form does not have a set schedule, but students are expected to complete 16 hours of additional work outside class (per week) across each of their A Level subjects.

Assessed work for each Year group will vary from subject to subject and may include a formal piece of written work completed at home or in class; class tests of varying length and frequency; End of Year Examinations for Years 7 – 10 and the Lower Sixth (in the Summer Term); Trial Examinations for Year 11 and the Upper Sixth; or Non-Examined Assessment (NEA - coursework) for those subjects which still have this element as part of the assessment schedule. Advice on how to prepare for such assessments will be provided in advance. For example, major assessments such as Trial Examinations and End of Year Examinations are added to the calendar at the start of the year, with a letter being sent to pupils and parents nearer the time, finalising specific details such as the timing and the day of each examination to be taken. For NEA subjects, the Head of Department will brief pupils on the relevant task and the deadlines for completion. Typically, they will also contact parents if there is a serious issue regarding progress towards completion or default of deadlines.



Revision for test and assessments should be an ongoing process rather than a last-minute cramming exercise. Pupils are encouraged to plan revision in advance and revisit their notes on a regular basis. Specific advice for individual Year groups forms part of the tutorial and Assembly programme for that Year group and will build over time as the nature and importance of test and examination increases. Those pupils who leave revision until the last minute may achieve some initial success in tests and examinations, however, as time passes, outcomes will diminish unless a change to a more planned and structured form of revision is made.

Across the whole School, a number of information evenings are held to assist parents in supporting the academic progress of their son or daughter. For Years 7 and 9, we hold a "Helping Parents to help their son" evening, this year on 18 and 28 September respectively. For Year 10, we are holding an "Education Evening" on 5 October, and for Year 11 there is an "Entry into the Sixth Form Evening" on 23 January. Lower Sixth students will have an "Education Evening" at the start of their courses on 14 September.

The Reporting Schedule at WHSB is well established and published in advance. For Years 7 – 10 and the Lower Sixth there are three Phased Reports, two of which are Data Reports, and one being a Full Written Report. These provide parents with information about current progress, target grades, attitude towards study, attendance information, behaviour and improvements to be made. Year 11 and the Upper Sixth all receive two Phase Reports, one Data and one Full Written, with a third Phased Report being reserved for those pupils who have underperformed in their Trial Examinations, for the purposes of monitoring the pupil's subsequent progress.

For the Lower School (Years 7 – 9), pupils are awarded grades based on the WHSB Lower School grading system, which is on the back of each report; this is an incremental scale across all three years. On the front of each report is the expected grade for that reporting phase, which allows parents to see whether their son is making the expected progress in each subject. For the Middle School, GCSE grades are awarded to indicate a pupil's current working grade. Sub-grades indicate the security of that grade: for example, 6a is a high grade 6 with the pupil close to moving up towards a grade 7, an 8b is a secure grade 8, and 9c is low grade 9,



meaning the pupil will need to work hard to maintain that grade. Over time, there should be an incremental rise in a pupil's grade in each subject as he progresses throughout his GCSE course. The Grades awarded to Sixth Form students are A Level grades, but indicate the likely grade a student will achieve if their current rate of progress is maintained through to the end of the course. The predictive element of this grading system fits in with the necessity to provide predicted grades for UCAS when students apply for university courses.

What should parents be looking out for in the Reports?

In addition to the grade awarded, on most Phased Reports, all Year groups are given four numerical Attitudinal Indicators for each subject. These rate a pupil's attitude towards certain aspects of study. The descriptors for Years 7 to 11, and the Sixth Form, which varies slightly, are found on the back of the Report. As rule of thumb for these indicators, if an indicator of 1 is awarded, the pupil is performing above expectation in that indicator; 2 means the pupil is in line with expectation, whereas a 3 or 4 would indicate that there is a serious issue which needs to be addressed as a matter of some urgency. High frequencies of a 3 or 4 being awarded would typically trigger an intervention from the relevant Pastoral Team.

Attendance and Punctuality are also indicated in each report, with attendance expected to be at 100%, and not less than 97%, with no instances of unauthorised absence. If attendance falls below 90%, the pupil is deemed to be "persistently absent" and there would likely be serious negative consequences in relation to expected outcomes should attendance fall below this level. The relevant Pastoral Team would have already been in touch with parents if attendance had been frequently below 97%, heading towards 90%. Ideally, pupils in Years 7 to 11 should not receive any behaviour points for poor behaviour. A pupil who repeatedly receives behaviour points will typically see the negative consequences in terms of outcomes. This, combined with poor attendance, often leads to a pupil seriously underperforming, which should not be a surprise at all.


For parents of Lower School pupils, it is important to keep track of your son's performance in the subjects of English, Mathematics and Science (or the three separate sciences in Year 9) as these subjects will form the six core GCSEs for all pupils in the Middle School, and seven for the more able mathematicians, who are invited to study GCSE Further Mathematics. Similarly, it is important for pupils to ensure they remain on track in both their Languages, and also in Geography and History, as pupils will be required to study at least one language at GCSE, and at least one of Geography or History. Pupils also are given three other free option choices in the options process during Year 9.

For parents of Middle School pupils, it is important that your son's performance reaches a total of 52 points or above across his best eight grades (calculated simply by summing his best eight grades). This is the minimum entry requirement for the Sixth From at WHSB; the vast majority of our pupils exceed this requirement, with the typical average being around 63-64 points, and many reaching the maximum of 72 points. Some A Level subjects have minimum GCSE entrance requirements, but not all, however it is becoming increasingly clear that achieving a grade 8 or 9 in a GCSE subject that a pupil wishes to study at A Level, is a significant advantage over a grade 7, especially in Mathematics and the Sciences.

Parents of Sixth Form students need to be aware that most degree courses at the best universities are likely to require a

grade B or above in each subject being studied, with the very best universities requiring an A or A* in each. Pupils wishing to apply for competitive areas such as Medicine, for example, are likely to need to achieve at least three A grades. Therefore, when looking at a Lower Sixth report for such a student, he or she should already be at, or very close to this due to the predictive nature of the grades awarded. Students with C and D grades, and with attitudinal indicators of 3 or 4 in the Lower Sixth, particularly in Biology and/or Chemistry, are unlikely to be suitable candidates for Medicine. Generally, promises of additional effort in the Upper Sixth on the student's part are unlikely to be successful in any competitive area – the hard work needs to begin at the start of the Lower Sixth and be maintained throughout the entire course. This should not be a problem for the student who has already established good working habits at GCSE and has achieved the best possible grades in the relevant subjects before entering the Sixth From.


YEAR 9 TAKE YOUR CHILD TO WORK DAY

This event provides an opportunity for pupils to hear from staff and senior students about the GCSE experience, as well as offering an opportunity for parents to see how they can support their children, and understand the sort of tasks they will be undertaking.

Those attending will have the opportunity to meet the Pastoral Team who will be supporting the pupils throughout their time in the Middle School, and to hear more about the positive correlation we see between those pupils who engage beyond the classroom and the achievement of academic success.

YEAR 9 ROAD SAFETY EVENT

Friday 6 October 2023

#YOLO is a performance by a visiting Theatre Company that investigates the consequences of not wearing a seatbelt and of poor passenger safety. It demonstrates the impact and consequences of a fatal traffic incident on family and friends.

The performance tells the story of road traffic casualty Sam, following Sam's sister and father who are left behind to deal with the trauma of losing a family member as they try to find out what happened in the last few minutes of Sam's young life.



Followed by a Year group workshop, it is designed to:

- Challenge perceptions and preconceptions around being 'just a passenger' with no influence over how a car is driven;
- Investigate the consequences of poor attitudes and behaviour as a passenger;
- Demonstrate and develop effective ways to challenge antisocial driving;
- Explore strategies for managing driver and passenger behaviour;
- Encourage personal responsibility;
- Identify and investigate effective ways to challenge peer pressure and peer influence;
- Highlight the importance of always wearing a seatbelt within a vehicle; and
- Consider the trauma and suffering that does occur to family and friends left behind after a fatal road incident.

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UPPER SIXTH PHASE 1 REPORT

Friday 6 October 2023

For each subject, a report will be issued that includes attainment and effort grades reflecting a student's current level of achievement. Careful consideration should be given to any changes that are apparent from the Lower Sixth Phase 3 Report issued in June 2023. All students should seek an improvement in their attainment and effort grades, where possible. Any regression or stagnation will require reflection on the use of private and supervised study periods, and reconsideration of study habits at home. Attainment grades reflect the national grade descriptors for A Level performance. After these reports

have been issued, and their contents carefully considered, additional support may be offered through academic mentoring and directed study periods.

Effort grades are awarded in the categories of attitude (inclass and out-of-class) and meeting deadlines. In the School's experience, a very strong correlation exists between effort grades and final A Level grades. Where problems emerge, pastoral support and guidance will be provided to students who will be expected to address concerns with proactive changes in their working methods.



CHARITY EVENTS DAY


Friday 13 October 2023

YEAR 9 PHASE 1 REPORT

Thursday 19 October 2023

On Thursday 19 October, Year 9 pupils will receive their Phase 1 Report.

This is an important report which informs parents as to how their son has started this academic year, and it will be significant in influencing GCSE Option Choices, the process for which begins in January 2024. Parents will receive a current attainment indicator in the form of a grade from each of their son's teachers, using the School's internal grading system.

It is expected that pupils will achieve a grade 6a (see diagram on page 32 which accompanies the item on Year 7 Phase 1 Reports); an alternative grade would indicate whether the pupil was performing above or below this level. The report also contains the pupil's Lower School target grade. The average target grade

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is 7b; therefore, if a pupil has a target above this, the School would anticipate that the pupil would be achieving a 6a or better. If the target grade is below a 7b, a grade 6a would be considered a strong result. This helps parents, the pupil and teachers to understand the pupil's current level of understanding, and identify areas of strength, and areas for development.

The report also contains attitudinal indicators; these are awarded on a scale of 1 (Exceptional) to 4 (Unacceptable). The expected indicator grade is a 2 (Good). Grades of 3 or 4 would require a change in attitude by the pupil, and a Grade of 1 is awarded when a pupil has already exceeded the high expectations of this School. Parents should consider the indicators received against the explanatory table on the back of the report.

Not only do the Curriculum Maps inform pupils and parents of what they will study during the current academic year, but they also provide an insight into future learning, which will assist pupils when it comes to choosing their GCSE option subjects during Year 9, and their A Level choices during Year 11. These Curriculum Maps are to be used alongside any option booklets pupils receive and they provide a quick and easy overview of the order in which topics are taught for all subjects within each Year group.


Curriculum Maps can also be used to help pupils revise for tests and, in particular, End of Year Examinations, as the required content is listed for each subject and provides a checklist to be used in conjunction with other revision materials.

When viewed across all divisions of the School, the Curriculum Maps provide a complete picture of how a subject is developed during the two, three, four, five or seven years that a typical WHSB pupil will study each subject, with the caveat that what is being viewed is the curriculum as it currently stands.

This Academic Year

In 2023-2024, the MFL Department will be running the next *Never Such Innocence* international competition, which focuses on how war affects young people. Further details are not available at the time of writing, but it is likely that we will be able to launch the competition in November. Further details will be shared in School once these are known. We were pleased with those entries we received in 2022-2023 and we would like to encourage more pupils to take part in this very well organised and highly regarded competition, in which we are confident that our pupils can achieve success.

Following the School's involvement last year, Mrs Genthe will be inviting top linguists in Year 9 to take part in the GCHQ National Language Competition 2023, to represent the School in this UK-wide competition. The competition will run from Monday 6 to Friday 10 November.

The competition will take place after the October Half Term break, and further details will be shared with pupils nearer the time. Year 8 pupils will be able to take part in the Translation Bee at around the same time.

Three of our pupils achieved UK-wide success in the Anthea Bell Prize for Young Translators during the last academic year. Over 15,000 entries were submitted from across the country, as the competition is establishing itself as a prestigious translation competition.

Rafael (Year 11) won the UK-wide prize for his translation of an excerpt of the German novel *Im Westen nichts Neues* by Erich

Maria Remarque. Ewan (Year 9) won the UK-wide prize for his translation of an excerpt of the Spanish novel *La liebre mecánica* by Galician author Ledicia Costas. Oliver (Year 9) was awarded the UK-wide runner-up prize for his translation of an Italian article linking reading and health. Oliver's translation read as if it had been originally written in English and stayed true to the meaning of the original text.






























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SIXTH FORM OPEN EVENING



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AUTUMN SINFONIA CONCERT

Thursday 16 November 2023, 7.30pm - 9.00pm

This term's Sinfonia concert begins with a focus on the British countryside, with music from composers Carwithen and Holst, and focusing on two English counties.

Carwithen's Suffolk Suite was written in 1964 at the request of a Suffolk school's Director of Music to celebrate the opening of their new concert hall. The work was designed for young musicians and is therefore a perfect fit for our orchestra. Carwithen uses romantic and 20th century techniques to paint a picture of Suffolk in her various shades, with sweeping strings representing the green countryside, and bold brass portraying the might and power of Framlingham Castle.

Holt's Somerset Rhapsody was written at a time when it was fashionable for composers to venture into the countryside, collecting the folk songs of local villages and hamlets before they died out. His music features a number of these melodies, from the modal "Sheep-Shearing Song" to the march-like "High Germany." Holst makes the most of the songs' varied moods, amplifying them with his flair for orchestration.

The concert will also feature Respighi's suite for the ballet Belkis, Regina di Saba, translated as "Belkis, Queen of Sheba." The music is suitably exotic, making use of lush strings to depict this sensual biblical heroine.



Songs from the New World, performed in London by the Philharmonia Orchestra

Thursday 23 November 2023

Dvorák's 'New World' symphony may be the most popular symphony composed in America, written by the Czech composer as he worked in New York City in 1890. The spirituals and folk songs heard by the composer on his travels around America's diverse and expansive land inspired him to write music that is now a familiar part of the canon.

But for the most popular symphony composed by an American, we must look to William Grant Still, a prolific and trailblazing black composer and a key figure in the Harlem Renaissance of the 1920s and 1930s. His First Symphony is an audience favourite in the US, but not often programmed by British orchestras. Its four short movements, 'Longings', 'Sorrows', 'Humor', and 'Aspirations', are threaded through with the sounds of the Blues, ragtime and jazz, and it culminates in a triumphant hymn of hope.

Soprano, Julia Bullock, will also join the orchestra to sing two settings by Margaret Bonds of poems by Langston Hughes – both composer and writer were leading lights of the Harlem Renaissance. Bonds discovered Hughes' poetry while at university and was inspired to continue her studies in the face of terrible racism. Later, she and Hughes became lifelong friends. Between the Bonds songs are three Gershwin classics, including the poignant lullaby from Porgy and Bess, 'Summertime'.

DECORATING THE HALL AND CHRISTMAS TREE 30 November 2023


As in recent years, the Old Westcliffian

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THE HOUSE SYSTEM

When students join Westcliff in Year 7 or the Lower Sixth, they are placed into one of four Houses – Harrier (yellow), Kestrel (red), Merlin (green) and Osprey (blue). If they have a brother or sister currently at the school, then they are placed into the same House. The bottom of their tie features a logo with the image of a coloured bird, the colour indicating the House to which they belong. Each House has one House Captain and two Vice-Captains from the Sixth Form who work with the younger pupils and help organise activities. There are also two House Representatives from each Year group.

Placing pupils in Houses enables inter-School competition and activity at all levels. There are many existing House Competitions and Activities, and new ones are being added to the programme all the time. Recent additions include House: Poetry, Lord of the Rings, Magic the Gathering, War Hammer, Bake-Off, Christmas Cards, Star Wars, Sports Quiz, Combined Sciences, Algorithms, Cartography, Harry Potter, Improvisational Theatre, Spelling, General Knowledge, Current Affairs, Music, Badminton, Rugby and Business.

This term, we are looking forward to enjoying the following House events:

House: Countdown; 'Keepy-Uppy' Football challenge; Mario Cart; Rocket League; Online Chess; Chinese New Year Report; Capital Cities; Robert Burns Research Project; Year 7 Mission to Mars Habitat Challenge; Design and Create a Species; Spanish/Languages; General Knowledge.

SENIOR DRAMA PERFORMANCE

Wednesday 6 - Friday 8 December 2023, 7.30pm - 9.00pm

"You start to freeze, as horror looks you right between the eyes". No, I am not talking about embarking on a lesson with my Upper Sixth students, but instead quoting lines from the Michael Jackson song *Thriller*, the glue that binds three Agatha Christie short plays that form our Senior Production in December. There is nothing so exciting as the chills, thrills and collywobbles of a good ghostly mystery, and Mrs Christie delivers three Christmas crackers for us to enjoy, full of snap and hats and a trick or two.

Agatha Christie certainly knows how to spin a good yarn. Dubbed "the Queen of Crime", Dame Agatha Christie has been outsold only by Shakespeare and the Bible. Born in Torquay in 1890 and writing up to her death in 1976, Christie wrote 66 detective novels and 14 short story collections, as well as the world's longest running play, the Mousetrap. Her works have sold over a billion copies in English and a further billion in translation. If there was a Golden Age of Detective Fiction, she has been its Mansa Musa, and readers all around the world have been gripped by her wonderful stories, such as those featuring the well-groomed moustaches of celebrated Belgian detective Hercule Poirot, or the doddering detection of that razor sharp old spinster, Miss Marple.

Masterpieces such as Murder on the Orient Express and Death on the Nile are well loved and much presented (and we all know whodunnit on the train and the steamboat) so this autumn the Senior Drama Production will bring to life three shorter Agatha Christie plays that we hope will really keep you guessing. The first, classically a radio play, centres around a series of ghostly phone calls made by a lady in white. Who is telephoning from Newton Abbott Station and how dark are her intentions? Our second tale is a classic whodunnit, with a sequence of colourful characters to suspect before the final denouement reveals a cold-blooded killer.

In our final play, a prominent lawyer meets with a new flame. But who will end up burnt? These are three tried and tested tales that show all the hallmarks of a Christie classic - clever twists, intriguing puzzles and engaging mysteries.

Can you feel that shiver running down your spine? There are two possible explanations. Either you have forgotten your homework for the scariest of teachers, or Dame Agatha is coming to the School Library Theatre this Christmas with her thrilling mysteries and exciting twists. Fortunately, I am delighted to say it is the latter! We hope to see audiences of all ages secure their tickets on *Ticketsource* and come along for an enjoyable evening that will keep you guessing.


GEOLOGY CONFERENCE

Friday 8 December 2023

The Geology Conference is an annual event, and an excellent introduction to the study of Geology. Throughout the morning sessions, speakers will be invited to address our Year 10, 11, Lower and Upper Sixth Geology students on a wide range of geology issues. Previous topics have included 'Mining methods and hazards'; 'Resources and Exploration'; 'Natural hazards and Volcanology' and 'the Permian mass extinction'. The speakers often pick up on strands of learning from Key Stage 4 and Key Stage 5 (especially the latter), and set out to stretch and challenge our students, whilst also giving them ideas about potential careers in geology.

Visiting speakers are Leicester University lecturers or geologists who are currently working in industry and are therefore exceptionally well placed to provide the latest ideas and research. Additionally, Old Westcliffian geologists are invited back to share their university experiences with existing students at the School and to provide information on university courses and university life. The afternoon session will take a different focus, introducing Year 9 pupils to interesting aspects of geology and encouraging them to consider studying Geology at GCSE level and beyond. Stanley Upton, an Old Westcliffian and current Oxford University student, is due to support the afternoon element of the Conference this year, and we will be delighted to welcome him back to School.


LEAVERS' CERTIFICATE COLLECTION

Whilst the rebuilding of the Old Westcliffian Association continues apace, I am delighted to report that our annual dinner held on 30 June was a tremendous success, with the highest turnout for some time.

It is clear that members' ability to invite a guest was hugely popular, and the evening was particularly special as it followed the official opening of the School's Centenary Room. The Room hosts a great collection of archive material and memorabilia, including much from the Old Westcliffian Association's history. During the dinner, we had the pleasure of wonderful live background music provided by the School's talented musicians.

We were particularly pleased to welcome Phyllida and Jeremy Stoke to both the official opening of the Centenary Room and our Annual Dinner. Jeremy's father, Mick, was the most highly decorated midshipman of the Second World War, and his bravery was astonishing. Jeremy has very kindly lent to the School part of his father's archive, including copy medals and some correspondence between Mick and a warmly remembered School Master, Ivan Brown. We were so pleased to also recognise Phyllida and Jeremy's kindness by awarding them Honorary membership of the OWA.

For members and guests wishing to visit the Centenary Room, arrangements should be made directly via the School. Whilst the School holds much archive material, there are significant gaps from the 1950's and 1960's. Therefore, any material held by Old Westcliffians from these decades, or indeed other periods in the School's history, would be gratefully received, whether as a donation or on loan. On that matter, we would like to thank Paul Sanders, Old Westcliffian (1949-1954) who visited the Headmaster during the summer holiday break to share with him some School and OWA publications and newsletters from 1950 onwards. We are delighted to have received these and will share them through the displays in due course. Should you wish to contact the School, either to make arrangements to visit or to discuss a donation or a loan of archive material, please contact Mrs Holly, the Headmaster's Personal Assistant.

Our knowledge of the School's past continues to grow. At the Dinner, I learnt that girls from St Bernard's School were taught A Level Physics at WHSB in the 1950s. Of course, we already know that pupils from WHSG received A Level Politics tuition at WHSB in the 1970's / 1980's, and pupils from both WHSG and St Thomas More have studied A Level Music at WHSB in the last decade or so. I anticipate that there is so much more of the School's history which was not available to Dr Alan White for his excellent book, and we are always pleased to hear more from Old Westcliffians who may be able to fill in any gaps.





Whilst progress has been a little slower than hoped, we are continuing to analyse the data from the recent Members' Survey. The response was pleasing and we hope to be able to publish and act upon the clear messages received in the coming weeks.


As Jon Gershinson notes, we were indeed delighted to officially open our Centenary Room on 30 June, to commemorate the School's Centenary Year in 2020. This is just one of a number of projects or events which were organised in celebration of Westcliff High School for Boys' 100 years but which. for reasons associated with the pandemic, had to be put on hold. However, we are now pleased to have this wonderful resource in place.

Aside from a dedicated space to display artifacts and materials collected since the School's opening in 1920, this room will double as a meeting room and a special resource for teaching, for example in History. We hope that in the years to come, Old Westcliffians will

continue to donate items, documents and other materials which can be shared with the wider School community and for the benefit of our current pupils.

I must also record my thanks to Phyllida and Jermey Stoke for attending this special event. Jeremy's father, G A (Mick) Stoke MBE DSC RN (Old Wescliffian, 1933 – 1939) sadly passed away in 1991 and, since that time, Jeremy has researched and recorded his father's remarkable life in his excellent book More Lives than a Ship's Cat (www.stokebooks.co.uk), a copy of which Jeremy has kindly donated to the School Library.

I shall leave you to enjoy the more detailed information, documents and copy medals that Jeremy has kindly shared with the School when you visit our Centenary Room. In the meantime, you will be interested to learn that Mick Stoke left WHSB in July 1939, having just turned eighteen, with the start of the Second World War only two months away. At WHSB he was a good all-rounder - 1st XV rugby, the tennis team, cross country team, athletics team and secretary of the sailing team, as well as the school pianist. All his School Reports are preserved in a hard covered binder and they are displayed in our cabinets.

Mick joined the Royal Navy as a regular officer and, from that point, the extent of his service to his country, his decorations and achievements are truly remarkable and I can promise you a fascinating read when you visit the display.

I would also like to record once again my sincere thanks to Jon Gershinson, our former Chair of Governors (2016-2022), for his support in connection with this project and for attending on this special occasion in June to officially open the Centenary Room.

The official opening was timed to coincide with this year's Old Westcliffian Association Annual Dinner and I would like to thank all those Old Westcliffians for their support in attending that occasion. It was a wonderful evening and I hope that you enjoy some of the photographs shared in this edition of *The Westcliff Diary*.

Many in our School community will have taken time to enjoy our display of the many vignettes which capture aspects of the School's history and/or the remarkable achievements of Old Westcliffians from across the generations. Our excellent series of vignettes is displayed around the corridors of the Main School Building and, if you have not yet had an opportunity to view them, I would encourage you to do so during a visit to the School.

In June this year, during the evening of the Old Westcliffian Association Dinner, it was my great pleasure to invite Honorary Alderman David Norman MBE, Old Westcliffian, to unveil the latest addition to our series of vignettes – a record of David's own outstanding personal and professional achievements, and the valued contributions David has made towards his School and wider society.

Westcliff High School for Boys

Honorary Alderman David Norman MBE

David Norman was born in Leigh in 1943. He attended Leigh North Street Primary School and passed the 11 plus, obtaining a place at WHSB in 1955.

David became politically active at an early age and proved himself a confident debater in the School's Debating Society. In 1965 he was elected to Southend Council and, at the time, he was said to be Southend's youngest ever Councillor.


At the age of 25, David was awarded a TUC Scholarship for a Diploma Course in the Industrial Relations Department of the London School of Economics. After a period of working for the then Labour Government's Prices and Incomes Board, he was successful in obtaining a scholarship to enable him to take up a degree course in Philosophy, Politics and Economics at St Peter's College Oxford.

Having always aspired to a career in the Labour Movement, after unsuccessfully contesting the Solihull Constituency in the March 1974 General Election, David went on to work as a Research Officer for the Post Office Engineering Union and was later promoted as General Treasurer (a post of Deputy General Secretary rank), which he held for 23 years. Throughout this time, David was heavily involved in adult education both inside and outside the Union, and served on several outside bodies, notably the Industrial Tribunals. In 1998 he was elevated to the Employment Appeal Tribunal, a prestigious Crown Appointment.

He served on the Labour Party Committee drawing up the Low Pay Policy, and on the Board of The Labour Weekly 'Tribune'. David also served for some 20 years as a Governor of the Ruskin Adult Education College in Oxford, including 12 years as Chairman, He was awarded an Honorary MA Degree for services to Adult Education by the Open University, and an MBE for services to Ruskin College.

Nearing retirement from his "day job", David was drawn back into local politics and he and his wife, Jane, were both elected to Southend Borough Council in 2001. He served for a further 19 years as a Councillor, during which at various times he was Labour Group Leader, Cabinet Member for Housing and Mayor in 2010-2011.

Although now officially retired, among other roles, David continues to serve as a Governor at WHSB, and he served as President of the Old Westeliffian Association (2011-2022). When he retired from Southend Council in 2019, he was awarded the post of Honorary Alderman.

This was a wonderful occasion and, during that afternoon, I was delighted to meet a number of Old Westcliffians with whom David has kept in touch, and to share in some of their memories and reflections of their School.

David and his wife, Sally, have remained strong supporters of WHSB over the many years since their sons, lain, Jeff and James, left the School - lain in 1992, Jeff in 1994, and James in 2001. Sally and David continue to attend our music concerts and other events to show their support for our current pupils, and I would like to record my thanks to them both for that support, which is greatly appreciated. We look forward to welcoming them back to the School for our programme of events this year.
